Listen to a talk about lan Fleming, who wrote the James Bond novels. For questions 11 - 20, decide whether the sentences below are True or False. You will hear the recording <u>TWICE</u>. You have one minute to read the questions for Part Two.

Female Voice:

Most people have heard of the fictional character, James Bond, the secret agent also known as 007. Ian Fleming created the James Bond character in 1953 and wrote twelve books which have been successful all over the world. The books have been the inspiration for films, video games, comics, radio shows and even children's toys.

How did Fleming decide on the name for his secret agent? Well, he took the name 'James Bond' from an American man who was an expert on birds and wrote books on this subject. Fleming had a copy of one of his books and decided that this name was perfect for his character because it was such a boring name. He wanted the James Bond character to be a very uninteresting person to whom exciting things happened. This was a very different idea from the character we see in the films today.

Fleming based the James Bond character on people he met in the navy during the Second World War. He also included his brother, Peter, who was involved in secret activities in both Norway and Greece. In addition, Fleming used his own experiences in the war and included names of his school friends and relatives in his books. The author also put some of his own personality into the James Bond character. For example, Bond enjoys playing golf, gambling and eating scrambled eggs just as Fleming did.

During the war, Fleming had visited the Caribbean island of Jamaica and fallen in love with it. In 1946, he bought some land there and built a bungalow which he called Goldeneye, possibly after a secret wartime operation he had been involved in. Although the bungalow was basic and not at all comfortable or luxurious, it gave Fleming the space he needed to concentrate on writing. Fleming worked for a newspaper in the 1950s. However, he spent January and February in Jamaica each year writing a new James Bond adventure. Fleming said he would never have written so many stories if he hadn't had these annual holidays. These also inspired the exotic places described in his books and helped make them popular. People loved to read

about these locations as they rarely travelled abroad in the 1950s. The James Bond novels are still as appealing today as each new generation enjoys reading about his adventures.
